Planning & Phases

If there is one thing the pandemic has taught us, it's the importance of outdoor spaces with people spending more time outside for socializing and everyday living. Make the most of your property with DIY projects that will improve your outdoor living space and add value to your home. Start by thinking of how you and your family want to use your outdoors and create a master plan. Include lighting in your design so you can use your outdoor space when the sun goes down. To make the process more budget-friendly, plan your projects so they can be done in phases over time. Whether you build a composite deck or a stone patio, adding a dining area will be the focal point for outdoor living. Other popular backyard features include a place for lounging, fireplace or fire pit area, outdoor kitchen and a shade structure. It's important to make an overall plan before you start phase one so that electrical. gas and water can be roughed-in for each additional phase at the beginning of your build. You want to avoid trying to retrofit any of these after-the-fact and possibly having to rebuild. Whatever the needs of your family, creating an outdoor living space can be a fun and creative process. A paver patio will add outdoor living space to your home and will be virtually maintenance-free except for the occasional power wash. Paving stones are available in dozens of shapes and colours so you can be as creative as you want with your patio design. The overall size will depend on the size of your yard and should be big enough to fit your outdoor furniture with plenty of room to walk around. Installation is an easy DIY project and can be done in a weekend depending on the size of your patio. It's crucial to carefully prepare the patio base that the pavers will sit on to ensure a solid surface with minimal heaving in the winter. Follow these steps to build a good base for a typical patio installation:

- 1. Prepare the area The patio area needs to be dug out and free of roots and rocks. Start by measuring and staking the outside perimeter of your patio and make sure the area is square. Use string and a line level to measure the depth you need for your base. The finished paver patio should sit level with the ground or slightly above so you will need to dig 7 inches plus the depth of your paver (you will be laying 6 inches of gravel paver base, 1 inch of paver leveling sand and the pavers on top). Note that pavers come in different heights. If you will be using your patio for heavy things, like a hot tub, you will need a thicker paver. Your patio should slope away from the house at least 1 inch every 8 feet for drainage. The most time you will spend on this project is preparing the area to get it right. Once you have this step done, this is the time to bury electrical cables if needed.
- 2. Tamp & layer Tamp the dirt base with a rented plate compactor. A hand tamper can be used for small projects but a plate compactor will do a better job in a big area. Add the gravel paver base 2 or 3 inches at a time and wet it between layers. Remember to maintain the slope away from the house. Once you have 6 inches laid, tamp the surface. Wetting the gravel will keep dust to a minimum when tamping. Next lay 1 inch of paver leveling sand, maintain the slope in the grade and tamp again.
- **3. Lay the pavers** It's a good idea to install paver edging around the perimeter of your patio. This is a hard plastic edging, the same height as your pavers, that secures the pavers and maintains the shape of your patio. Stake it in the ground to secure. Start laying the pavers in a corner and on a hard edge such as a wall if possible. Use wood stakes and string to act as a guide to keep your rows straight and square. Place stones straight down into the sand and fit them together snugly. Tap the tops of the stones with a rubber mallet to make sure they sit even. Depending on the laying pattern, finish off rows with half-sized blocks. Some cutting of stones may be necessary to fit odd size spaces, check the manufacturer guidelines for cutting instructions.
- **4. Top with polymeric sand** Using a push broom, sweep polymeric sand across the surface of the pavers to completely fill the gaps in between. Use the plate tamper on the surface of the pavers, sweep again with polymeric sand then tamp one final time. Use the broom to remove all excess polymeric sand from the surface. The sand should be in the gaps only. Once the surface is clean, wet the pavers with water. The water will react with the polymeric sand to form a tight, mortar-like joint.



Build a fire pit (from a kit)

A wood-burning fire pit is a great addition to your outdoor entertaining area and one that can be relished year-round. Building a fire pit from a kit is an easy DIY weekend project. Kits can be square or circular and include enough heatresistant concrete stones to build a pit usually three rows high with no need for cutting. Each fire kit brand has it's own set of instructions but generally they all start with a level and compacted gravel base. You can have the first row beneath ground level or have it sit on ground level. If your kit includes a steel liner, use that as your template when you lay the first row of stones. Make sure your stones are level and lay a bead of landscape block adhesive between rows for stability. Adding a layer of lava rock to the base of your firepit will increase the heat generated by the burning wood.

Fire pit safety tips

- Always check with your municipality for local fire codes before you start your project. There may be limits on the size of the fire pit you can build, how far it can be from your home or other structures as well as limits on which days you can burn
- Build on level ground
- Don't place a fire pit beneath a tree or overhang
- Don't build on a wood deck
- Teach your kids about fire safety and always have an adult supervise
- · Keep a hose or fire extinguisher close by





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Light up your exterior

There are three major functions of outdoor lighting: safety, security and ambiance. A well-lit outdoors makes navigating around your property easier and safer while deterring intruders. Typical areas to light up are your front porch, exterior doors, house numbers, entertainment and cooking areas, steps, garage, walkways and landscaping. Light up the front of your house with decorative wall and pendant lighting, soffit lights as well as flood lights pointed up into trees or directed at the house. Light up walkways with path lights, placed 10 to 15 feet apart, to softly illuminate the way. All these types of lighting can be incorporated into your backyard along with additional lighting to make an inviting outdoor space for entertaining. These can include postcap lights, deck lights, fence lights, overhead strings of lights and decorative lanterns. Well placed motion activated security lights are a good idea for both the front and back of your property. It's recommended to use LED outdoor lights wherever possible. LEDs give you brighter light with a longer life and use significantly less energy. Solar-powered lights are great for areas where there is plenty of sunshine and electricity is not easily accessible.

Lawn & garden Cleaning up your front and back yards is a good place to start getting your outdoors ready for spring and summer. Choose a sunny day and enjoy spending time outside. Remove leaves and dead plants from garden beds as well as broken branches from greenery. Early spring is a great time to prune plants and trees and give shrubbery a haircut. De-thatch your lawn with a good raking and apply spring fertilizer. When temperatures are warm enough, seed your lawn if needed.



Power wash In short, power wash everything. Hard surfaces can become muddy and grimy over the winter, especially near ground level. Surfaces in shady areas can also have a layer of algae, mould or even moss from last summer. Use a power washer to blast away all this grime and make your surfaces look new again. Don't forget to power wash sidewalks, fences, decking, outdoor furniture, siding, brickwork and your front steps. Annual power washing is a great way to maintain the outdoor areas of your house.



Windows Clean windows not only make the outside of your house sparkle, they make an incredible difference when looking out from the inside of your home. Many modern window designs allow you to clean the outside of windows from inside your house. If you don't have this feature, use a ladder to get to second story windows. For extremely high windows, use a sponge mop on an extension pole. Direct sunshine will dry soap too quickly so clean windows on a cloudy day and use a squeegee to prevent streaks.



Gutters Winter storms blow leaves and debris into rain gutters which makes clogging a real possibility. When spring rain begins, you want your gutters to be clear and ready to handle large amounts of water. Wear gloves and scrape out as much debris and gunk as possible. Also make sure your downspouts are unclogged. Use a hose with a spray nozzle to rinse out any remaining debris in the gutters and downspout. Check to make sure your downspouts are directing water away from the foundation.
